Book Tasting at the Sweet Plot Cafe -- and Much More!

Students in grades 6-12 attended a "Book Tasting at the Sweet Plot Cafe," a two-day event in November created and hosted by OBI librarian, **Emily Kelley**. Each grade level met at the library for one class period to sample various literary selections.

Ms. Kelley explained, "A book tasting is an event where you can try a 'taste' of a book or genre in hope you will find something new you might like.

The genres covered were non-fiction, poetry, science fiction, realistic fiction, historical fiction, biographies, and mysteries. Students looked at the cover and inside flaps of a book and read a few pages. They filled in blanks on a menu with information and personal impressions from the books they 'tasted.' Then they were served cupcakes. I think they had fun, but most liked the cupcakes at the end the best!"

Many of the students were pleasantly surprised by the experience. One guest commented, "My favorite part about this was that it was something different and creative. I've never done something like this in any library. It was cool." Another patron wrote, "I liked that it pushed us out of our comfort zones. I did like books, and I didn't expect to." Complimenting the event and the chef, another reviewer said, "It was great to view books that I normally would look right over!"

The book tasting was just one of a number of ways Ms. Kelley is hosting events sponsored by the library...She has each grade (K4-5th) for 20 minutes weekly as one of their electives. Ms. Kelley reads them a story. Grades 2-5 then check out books. K4-1st

grade get a video or sing-a-long that matches the book read that day. "I'm working on teaching them library skills, like the parts of a book, author, illustrator, and genres," Ms. Kelley explained.

Students are welcome in the library each morning before school starts, and are given activity options. "I set up a seasonal craft station and have seasonal coloring pages," Ms. Kelley said. "There are also playing cards. I hope to get out a few board games in the future. Some students do homework or play computer games."

Ms. Kelley stated, "In today's libraries, there are often 'Makerspaces' set up with activities that involve technology, coding, robotics, sewing, design, etc.. Many are STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) or STEAM activities (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics). I'm working on creating more opportunities for the students to do these things in the mornings. I'm looking for grants to apply for, and I'm collecting Legos so they can engineer things. \square


Our New Vice-President: Meet Dr. Scott

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
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We Love Our "Mighty Mountaineers"



You know about cheerleaders and pep bands, right? But what about an energetic group of Lower School students called the "Mighty Mountaineers?"

New boys' basketball coach, **Anthony Hibbard**, started the children's squad with his wife, **Holly**. "We think it's essential for any program to have some sort of coinciding youth program," Hibbard explained. "This allows us to interact with young students in the community, and also gives these students a glimpse of our overall basketball program. It allows me, as the head coach, to

meet and work with the future of our program directly."

Hibbard said, "The program is designed for young students to develop not only their basketball skills, but their love for the game." Each participant wears a blue jersey and shorts with a big "O," and has a matching blue basketball. The routine is filled with basketball skills and loud, fun music. They perform at half-time of most games. "We want The Mighty Mountaineers to be part of the overall basketball experience," Hibbard stated. "We want our young students to feel pride putting on a uniform and representing the 'O."

The Mighty Mountaineers actually conduct their practice sessions before the basketball season starts. "This allows us to create a routine and help the students practice," Hibbard noted. "Once the season

starts, we just perform at games. When I'm not able to lead the routine, my wife steps in and leads. We also have another helper, **Ashley Gay**."

"My hope is for the Mighty Mountaineers to grow in numbers each year," Hibbard shared. "I want these young students and their families to feel inclusive and valued. We want them to know that they are part of our family now, which extends greater than basketball. When our varsity basketball team breaks huddles or timeouts, we always break on 'family.' We define family as, 'Forget about me. I love you.' We want this mindset to supersede everything else in our program and community. You are one of us now."
