Jen-Hsun Huang Hall dedicated

On August 2, 2019, Oneida Baptist Institute in Oneida, Kentucky dedicated Jen-Hsun Huang Hall, our new girls' dormitory and high school building.

This project was made possible by a generous benefactor -- Jen-Hsun Huang, Founder and CEO of NVIDIA, one of the world's leading technology companies. He and his wife, Lori, provided a matching grant of two million dollars for the facility.

Huang was Fortune's Business Person of the Year in 2017. He earned his undergraduate degree in Electrical Engineering from Oregon State University and a master's degree in Electrical Engineering from Stanford University.

He has ties to Oneida Baptist Institute stretching back to his child-hood. At age nine in the mid-1970's, Huang and his brother lived at Oneida Baptist Institute, though Oneida then was only a high school. The boys at-

tended classes at the nearby Oneida Elementary School.

Huang and his family participated in the dedication service, and he shared many anecdotes from his Oneida days. Though he was only at the school for a brief time, he said, "Some of my happiest memories are of Oneida Baptist Institute."

Jen-Hsun Huang Hall is 34,000 square feet and houses 32 dorm rooms with a capacity for 128 girls, plus 12 classrooms. □
