Abbi was our Most Outstanding eighth grade girl. Born in Kentucky, she grew up in Tanzania. Abbi returned to the Commonwealth for a very practical reason: "It was my best option for getting an education in the U.S."

She has played volleyball and basketball, and has been on track/field. She has also participated in FCA,

ONE, academic team, and Student Ambassadors.

Abbi said, "I didn't expect to get this award; I honestly don't know why I did." One of her teachers, Sarah Hawley, said of Abbi, "She strives to do her very best in everything she does. Abbi goes above and beyond expectations in assignments given to her. She is caring and thoughtful to her fellow students and teachers. Abbi is the model student."
