Our boys' track/field team advanced to state competition after winning second place in the region. This was the fourth year in a row for OBI to be represented at state in track/field.



# **Farming with** hydroponics



This spring we began reaping a harvest from our new hydroponics system on the OBI farm. Hydroponics is the art of growing plants in a mineral-based solution with or without an alternate growing medium such as perlite or gravel, in the absence of soil. The time between planting and harvesting can be shortened by a few weeks because the plants receive more nutrients from constantly moving water than they would from soil.

Hydroponically raised tomatoes and lettuce appeared in our dining hall first, followed by cucumbers. Farm Manager Marty Bevil stated, "I want to be able to supply the kitchen year-round with all the vegetables they can possibly eat."

# off to a good start

Dean of Students Claudia Kelsey is quite pleased with the new venture. "The goal of the Resident Assistant (RA) program is to set the tone for life in the dorm," she explained.

The dormitories already had hall monitors, but they only made sure everyone was in bed on time. Mrs. Kelsey and others believed students could take a greater leadership role, much like resident assistants in college dorms. "The RAs (pictured above with dorm staff) are to set an example by their own behavior," she said.

RAs work different shifts, beginning right after school. Weekends are included. While on duty, they are to leave their doors open and be available to the other students on their floors. RAs talk to peers who are having problems. They are role models and mentors. They listen to what's going on around them, and intervene as needed.

Mrs. Kelsey recalled one time when she began to deal with a conflict between two girls, only to discover that the RA had already taken care of it. Sometimes a houseparent might ask an RA to talk to a student who is going through a difficult time, or to help mediate in a dispute. If a resident assistant is working with younger students, he/ she may need to deal with hygiene issues. The RA, however, does not serve in any way as a disciplinarian, but only in a supportive role.

To be an RA, a student must be a junior or a senior, complete a written application, have been at OBI at least one semester, and have good relationships with the houseparents. Hopeful RAs are interviewed by Mrs. Kelsey; Jennifer Fanin, Dean of Girls; Jeff Kelsey, Dean of Boys; Angie Gritton, Administrative Assistant; and Dr. David Price. Campus Minister.

Resident assistants are not paid for their work, but they do earn Career Placement hours. They get a number of "perks" as well, such as having one roommate instead of three. They also may have a small couch, minirefrigerator, microwave, and Keurig® in their rooms.

Kirkman Everett was an RA, and he said, "I enjoyed working with my peers and being able to make a difference."
