OBI athletes compete at state level in tennis and track

On May 7, the OBI boys' and girls' tennis teams each placed first in the 14th region tennis tournament. The team scores included first-place wins by Choopat Suvimolstean (OBI '17) in boys' singles, Priya Sukkanha in girls' singles, Andrew Lee and Misha Natvshak in boys' doubles and Mianna Baker and Aubrey Baker in girls' doubles. Doubles team Alvin Gibson and Seth Shockley finished in the region semifinals. All eight players advanced to the state tournament, the fourth time for Choopat and Mianna and the second for Misha.

Oneida wasrepresented at the state track meet this spring for the fifth year in a row. Junior Isador Yesuf competed in the 3200-meter race. He advanced to state after winning this event at the regiona level.



Most of

the team were seniors. Since the state meet was held on the same day as our graduation, the others chose not to compete at regionals, since they could not advance to state.

Coach Steve Grant said, "It was a good year with many good results. Many of the athletes placed well in their events and some tried new events." He spoke of their positive attitudes, adding, "Everyone on the team worked well and supported each other. They were cooperative and a pleasure to work with."

OBI student gualifies for both **Governor's School for the Arts** and state FFA Convention



Stephen King had a busy, honorsfilled summer.

The senior began by participating in the state FFA Convention in June in Lexington. He competed in extemporaneous speaking, after coming in first in this category

at the regional level.

In extemporaneous speaking, Stephen had to make an impromptu speech about one of 14 possible topics. He said he enjoyed the challenge; "You have to be fast on your feet and shoot from the hip." Stephen has been in FFA for four years, and was president last year.

Stephen's second adventure was Governor's School for the Arts at Center College June 18-July 8. He was one of over 200 high school students who received three weeks of college-level training in disciplines such as creative writing, film and photography, architecture and design, musical theatre, visual arts (both drawing/painting and sculpture/ceramics), instrumental music, and vocal music.

One of 36 students in the visual arts category, Stephen took part in studio time as well as attending lectures, presentations, ballet and theatre productions. He went with the group to Louisville to tour the Kentucky Center for the Arts and the Speed Art Museum.

Spending that much time with other like-minded and similarly talented teens was "very refreshing," Stephen said. "Everyone had the same passion," he explained. "We all want to give back to the world and inspire hope. Everyone there was an inspiration to me."

In addition to being motivational, GSA was also educational. "I learned some new painting techniques," Stephen stated. "It was my first time to work with clay. And I learned how to do print making."

Stephen has loved art since the third grade. He hopes to do art professionally. "I know now that I can be an artist and survive," he said. 🛛
