## **OBI** expands program to include day students in grades K-5

The 2015-16 school year began with a major addition to our program -local students in grades K-5.

The theme scripture verse for this project has been Matthew 19:14, in which Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me." Oneida president Larry A. Gritton, Jr. (OBI '93) stated, "We are doing all we can to let them come to Him because we know the kingdom of God belongs to these little ones."

When Oneida Baptist Institute first opened its doors on January 1, 1900,

100 children of all ages took their seats. Our founder. James Anderson Burns. believed the best way to stop the feuding in the area was to educate the children. Tens of thousands of young people have since passed through this unique little place called Oneida.

The population at OBI has changed

through the years. When public elemen-

tary education became available in the area, Oneida began accepting only high school students. In the 1970's, we brought back the middle school grades. Then in August of 1984, the primary and elementary grades were re-opened, but only for the children of OBI faculty/staff who lived in school housing. Now, however, local families are welcomed and encouraged to send their K-5 youngsters to Oneida.

In the 1990's we typically had 100 local students each year. Two years ago, that number had dropped to nine. By late August of this year, we had 59 day students, not counting our 52 staff children. Gritton hopes that number will continue to grow. "I love that our kids come from all over our state, country, and world, but I also know our own back yard is filled with kids who need an Education for Time and Eternity," he explained. "My favorite thing about this school year has been seeing the little K-5 children on our campus. It warms my heart and gives me great satisfaction to know we are fulfilling

our original calling and mission."

Our lower school (grades K-5) hosted an open

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house on August 25. Family members were invited to visit their children's classrooms and talk with the teachers about how the students were doing. One of the parents who attended was Rachel Barger. Her daughter, Raylon, is in the fourth grade. "We had several different reasons for wanting her to come to OBI," Mrs. Barger explained. "Our friends talked of how good it is here, how friendly everyone is, and how their kids were never bored." Another advantage Oneida has for local families is that their children may attend free of charge.

Lower school principal, Bonita Robinson, is excited about opening our K-5 program to the community. "Our first goal is to be diligent and intentional about teaching our students the two most important things for a successful life -- education and salvation," she shared. "If our students learn how to be good citizens, the importance of service and characteristics of leadership taught through the life of Christ, the rest will come."
