Swimmers go to state competition



After an outstanding season in which the team took three first-place trophies and numerous seconds, one individual and one relay team advanced to the state level swim competition.

This season Oneida swimmers took home more trophies and medals than they had in multiple past years combined. OBI won second overall at the EKU Relays meet, with the boys taking first and girls third; first overall at the Somerset meet and first in the Barbourville Snowball Invitational.

At the regional meet, one of our seniors, Robera Legesse from Ethiopia, punched a ticket to state in the 100-meter butterfly and again with his relay team for the 400-meter free style, where they came in second. This relay team consisted of junior Ivan Gonzales and seniors Robera Legesse, Daniel Fonseca and Everett Kirkman.

Daniel has been swimming for two years, Ivan for four, Robera for one, and Everett for nine. This is the first time any of them have made it to a state competition, and the first time in many years that OBI has sent athletes to state in swimming.

Coach **Kirbee Parkhouse** said, "I think this is a huge accomplishment. It'll be an eye-opening experience for everyone who is going. I think [the underclassmen] will work a lot harder to make it there again."

There were also six first-time swimmers who made it to the regional meet and swam like champions. Assistant Coach **Amy King** said, "If they stay, they've all got potential. They'll really go far."

When asked how she felt about the teams overall and compared to last year, King replied, "The team was much more cohesive this year and worked well together. The team captains, **Stephen King** and **Megan Stiles**, helped hold the team together and really made them feel like a family."

Coach Parkhouse added, "Every year...the teams have gotten better, but this year there were more goals set and more goals accomplished!"



Athletic Hall of Fame nomination criteria

The purpose of the OBI Athletic Hall of Fame is to recognize and honor our outstanding coaches and athletes. The Hall of Fame Committee consists of the President, Principal(s), Athletic Director and coaches who have coached a state-recognized sport for five years or more at OBI and are still employed by our school. Nominations may be made by any person. The inductees will be chosen by the Athletic Hall of Fame Committee.

Requirements for eligibility for nomination of an athlete:

- 1. The nominee must have been outstanding in one or more sports while a student at OBI.
- 2. The nominee must have left OBI in good standing.
- 3. A nominee must have graduated from high school--not necessarily from OBI--at least five years before he/she is inducted into the Hall of Fame. Only his/her OBI achievements will be considered.
- Requirements for eligibility for nomination of coaches:
- 1. Any coach whose team wins a KHSAA-sanctioned state championship is automatically considered for induction.
- 2. Any other coach to be considered must have been a varsity head coach at OBI for at least three years. Additional requirements for eligibility for nomination:
- 1. Nominee must be present at the induction ceremony. If unable to attend due to illness, the nominee may be represented by a family member.
- 2. The nominee may be someone already deceased. In this event, he/she will be represented by a family member at the induction ceremony. Persons interested in nominating a former OBI athlete or coach should send information such as newspaper clippings, statistics, a picture of the nominee (preferably a photo made at or around the time the person was at OBI), and/or other items of documentation that make the nominee worthy of consideration. Enclose information with the nomination form on page 4.
