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# **Cross country goes to** state competition



Oneida's boys' cross country team and one runner from the team girls' ran in the state meet November 9 in Lexington. Thev

qualified for state competition by finishing third in the region.

Mianna Baker, our girls' state contestant, came in sixth in the regional race. Coach Megan Jaspersen noted, "That's pretty impressive since Mianna's an eighth-grader." Sophomore Eric Grant finished fourth of the boys at regionals.

Coach Joey Jaspersen (OBI '04) said, "It's a big honor to go to state. At the regional meet they ran against good competition, and they didn't hold anything back."

This year's team was mostly an experienced group, though three new runners stayed with it for the whole season. Veteran team members Eric Grant, Jake Nichols, Trevor DeMaria, Mianna Baker, and Jordan Cochran were joined by newcomers Cody Sallee, Woo Rim Han, Alex Quarshie, Madison Kehler, and Essence Wilson.

The 2013 season saw many runners improving their personal best times. "We were continually impressed with their consistently improved times," Mrs. Jaspersen stated. "They did what we asked of them." Mr. Jaspersen agreed; "It was neat to watch them beat their own times. I told them, 'Don't be concerned with what others do or you'll get off your pace."

The Jaspersens were pleased with their athletes' attitudes and effort. "They were optimistic and positive overall," Mr. Jaspersen said. They went above and beyond what we asked them

to do with a lot of zeal. They had a great work ethic."

The Jaspersens estimated that each runner logged an average of 200 miles this season. 🖵

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# Soccer team regional first runner-up



Our soccer team had a victorious 2013 season. They won the All A Thirteenth Region title, and then took first place in the sectional playoff between the thirteenth and fourteenth regions. This meant Oneida represented both regions in the Elite Eight All A State Tournament. Our players and coaches gave up three days of their fall break to play in the All A State Tournament.

The team also finished as first runner-up in the Thirteenth Region's tournament. They ended the season with nine wins, seven losses, and two ties. This was the first time the Mountaineers had made it all the way to the regional championship game since the year 2000. Athletic Director, Laura Stockton (OBI '86) stated, "We were ranked number two in the region going into the regional championship game."

Keith Orr was assistant coach this year, helping head coach Mike Waslewski. Orr was not surprised at the team's success. "We had eight seniors," he said, "so I expected them to do well."

The co-ed team included eight girls, who were "the surprise of the year" according to Orr. "They consistently did well," he said, "and they showed a lot of character. They were phenomenal."

Along with the talent and experience, Orr saw "a huge improvement from the beginning of the season to the end." He spoke to their hard work and determination: "They were always striving, right to the end."  $\Box$ 



# **Sunday School class a definite success**

A year ago, two OBI adult ministry team members saw a need and decided to fill it, receiving dramatic results. **Bobby** and **Amy Nelson** (OBI '88) started a Sunday school class that began with 12-15 stu-



dents. By Christmas, they were averaging 35 and attendance eventually peaked at 60. Their secret? "It's their class. We just try to make it fun and relevant to them," Mrs. Nelson explained.

The Nelsons may use *The New Christian's Handbook*, by Max Anders; *Jesus Freaks*, by D.C. Talk, or *Voice of the Martyrs*, but Mrs. Nelson prefers to "wing it," discussing questions the students ask. Occasionally other staff members lead or students teach the class themselves. "Last year one of the boys, **Jamark Cox**, taught from Revelation," Mrs. Nelson recalled. "He even brought in Old Testament prophecies." When students teach, the Nelsons facilitate. "The students pay more attention if one of them is leading," Mrs. Nelson said.

Last spring, the Sunday school class went on a field trip to the Creation Museum in Petersburg, Kentucky. Students paid their own way and additionally had to earn the privilege of attending. They accumulated points by going to the class weekly, bringing their Bibles, bringing friends, attending other Christian campus meetings, memorizing scripture, giving testimonies, keeping Bible reading and prayer journals, and doing acts of service. "The students never cease to amaze me," Mrs. Nelson stated. "Every time we've given them a challenge, they've risen to meet it."

Jamark, a sophomore, was one of the founding members of the class. He likes the fact that "They give us the chance to share testimonies and teach sometimes. Everyone has a voice."  $\Box$

For the first time in nearly 20 years, OBI has a high school quick recall academic team. Some 16 students have joined the team, which practices each weekday afternoon.

Our quick recall Mountaineers won their first two matches. "They're usually on top of their game," said coach **Cheryl Monroe**.

Quick recall features four students from each

of two teams competing to answer verbal questions over a wide range of topics. Questions may come from the fields of history, government, science, movies, sports, computer science, music, and trivia. "The answers might come from what they learn in class or from their own interests," Monroe explained. In addition to quick recall, academic teams can compete in written assessment, composition, and future problem-solving.

All of our team members are new to academic team except senior **Isaac Back**, who did quick recall and written assessment competitions in his former school. He is glad OBI now offers this co-curricular activity. "It's a great opportunity to hang out with friends and get to learn things in the process," he said. "It's good to be able to use random knowledge that we don't usually use in school."

Monroe described her team members as "extremely enthusiastic." She stated, "I've been impressed with their attitudes. They're so competitive; they've really enjoyed it so far. We have a broad range of interests." Those varied interests are essential to success, since Monroe reports, "They cover every subject in high school and more."
